### On this rock I will build my Church

The Faith of our Fathers

**1870, a new decade!** Between 1860-70 the population of the nation increased by 23% and the state by 36%. And the immigrants kept coming.

Our nation now numbered 37 states. Civil War hero Ulysses Grant was president. Reconstruction of the devastation from the war was still ongoing; the Industrial Revolution thriving. Oil had been discovered in Pennsylvania in 1859. Kerosene now replaced whale oil to light homes and churches. Thomas Edison was 23 years old and by the end of this decade the world would be introduced to the telephone, light bulb and phonograph though none would see household use for many years. Yellowstone became the first National Park and a son of German immigrants introduced Heinz Ketchup to the world.

As to the city, back in 1835, 4000 acres had been acquired by the Fond du Lac Land Company and a plat drawn out. The city was officially founded in 1837 with a population of 8. There was a saw mill in the area and a post office of sorts. Mail was carried by foot from Green Bay. Now, 33 years later the city was a railroad hub and numbered well over 17,000, second only to Milwaukee. Children 5 and under were not counted as nearly half of them, 47%, would die before their 6<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Synod definitely needed to resolve the seminary situation. The solution was strong and thriving in Missouri. Large numbers of "Old Lutherans" settled there before

1820. By 1823, St. Louis was a city. Concordia Seminary had been founded in a one room log cabin in Perry, MO in 1839, eight years before there was a Missouri Synod. This Preparatory Department and School of Theology moved to St. Louis in 1849. Our Wisconsin Synod had continued acquiring pastors from Germany who had been trained in reformed theology. This was weakening our doctrinal stand. It was the Missouri Synod pastors that corrected and stabilized our synod. It was logical, therefore, to train our pastors in St. Louis. This arrangement lasted from 1870 through 1878 and doctrinal alliance continued for almost a century.

At St. Peter's, the school and congregation continued to grow. A reinvigorated and much loved Pastor Streissguth served the congregation well for 5 years. He left for St. Paul, MN in January, 1872. The congregation rejoiced when Meumann, who had earlier served as interim pastor, returned. The male teacher also left. For a brief time in 1872 there was neither a pastor nor male teacher. The lady teacher moved up and the young children were taught by two eighth grade girls.

Ever since Luther, Lutherans have loved to sing. It was also in 1872 that Synod produced its first hymnal (words only, no music) which St. Peter's adopted. Musically inclined members could barely make it through a service. Most singing was done acapella. Their fellow members came from every region of Germany. Everyone singing was singing a different tune. Out of frustration the Mixed Choir was born. They practiced every week and established the tradition of the marvelous music that continues to bless our congregation to this day.

In 1873 another building project was tackled. The steeple was built and the exterior of the church got brick veneer. The young congregation dealt strongly with doctrinal issues of lodge membership and fellowship. The resolutions adopted have held the congregation firm to scripture these many years.

While St. Peter's was prospering and flourishing, sister congregations to the north were still reeling. In October, 1871 the Peshtigo fire roared through the north woods obliterating 1.5 million acres, 17 towns and countless lives.
