PASTOR'S UPDATE NO. 2 Pastor Boehringer is done with chemotherapy. Things could always change, and are always in the hands of Jesus, but if the current plan stays on track, the surgery will be September 13. He'll be preaching one more time this summer, the weekend of Labor Day. Please note that for the September 1 service Pastor will preach and then depart; he won't be in the narthex before or after church and he won't be assisting with Holy Communion. This is because his team at Froedtert has advised him to isolate prior to surgery. After Sept. 1 you won't see Pastor Boehringer until after September and October at least. St. Peter's has been blessed with faithful pastors throughout its long history. With a membership of nearly 1000 souls, a flourishing day school, and many unchurched in our community, the work and opportunities are great. Currently, St. Peter's is guided by two full-time pastors and one part-time visitation pastor, but the possibilities for strengthening personal contacts and connections within the congregation and to bring the Gospel to more individuals and families within our community suggests that a third full-time pastor would be beneficial.

The idea of adding a third pastor to our ministry has been discussed for decades. We are revisiting this topic once again as the need for a third full-time pastor has not changed. There will be an opportunity this fall to hear from the leaders looking for this proposal to become a reality. At that time you will have the opportunity to have your questions answered and to provide your feedback.

The Faith of our Fathers

The 1880's, another new decade. Rutherford Hayes was in the White House. He was replaced by James Garfield on March 4, 1881. What followed was another national tragedy though not nearly as dramatic as the loss of Lincoln. Garfield was shot on July 2, died on September 19 and Chester Arthur became president.

And the immigrants kept coming. In fact, the time spanning 1881 – 1884 saw the largest influx of Germans in history entering the state. These newcomers were mainly hard working and well educated. With industrialization, the work force could absorb them. Jobs were available but wages were barely livable. A male factory worker was paid \$35 a month for 10-hour work days. This was sufficient to support the worker and a wife, but not a family. In Milwaukee, mainly out of necessity, 80% of children over 12 opted for a job instead of school. Children as young as 8 worked in factories. Women and children were paid less and by law were to work only 8 hours a day. The laws were not enforced. If the worker didn't comply with demands there was someone else to do the job.

Life was becoming more "modern." Child mortality rate was slowly decreasing. It is now 35% - 65 out of every 100 babies born would live to see their 6th birthday. Life expectancy was still 40 years. It was very common for a family to have suffered not only the death of a child but also a parent. Large cities were becoming electrified. It would be another 50 years for rural America. Walking was still a way of life and air conditioning meant opening a window. The only fans were made of paper. In 1884 Ball glass canning jars were perfected. Dramatic changes were on the horizon for health and welfare.

Fond du Lac was blessed to be situated in an area of the country with bountiful resources. The reorganized agricultural society had a 50-acre fair ground and sponsored 22 different annual fairs. Check out online: formycousins.com; 1878 Atlas Fond du Lac

The Wisconsin Synod reopened our seminary in a private home in Milwaukee and would soon purchase and remodel a suitable building at 13th and Vine. This sufficed for the next decade. After years of planning, the Minnesota Synod laid the foundations of Dr. Martin Luther College. "Old Main" was dedicated November 9, 1884. It would be another twelve years before women would be enrolled for a

three-year teacher's course. Google: "History of DMLC New Ulm" issuu.com has posted the 1934 50th anniversary booklet.

St. Peter's congregation was improving the amenities at church and school. In 1880 "fine" seats were purchased for the two classrooms at a cost of \$432. The handmade long plank desks were retired with hundreds of students' initials carved in them! The new desks could accommodate a container of ink and the "dip pen" became a popular writing tool. In November the decision was made to add a 3rd class. The new teacher was Anna Schmedtjen. She would be a fixture at St. Peter's for the next 23 years. In 1881, the synod convention met at St. Peter's for the third time. Housing delegates in private homes was still the custom. With increasing enrollment, in early 1882 the congregation resolved to build another new school building. Construction began that same year and was completed Spring 1883. It had 3 large classrooms, still no plumbing or electricity. The old school was moved to a new location.

On August 12, 1883, the 25th Jubilee was observed. Congregations from Eldorado, Van Dyne and Oshkosh joined in the celebration. Former Pastor Streissguth preached for the morning service and Mayerhoff for the afternoon service. Evening services were rarely held because kerosene lamps did not produce enough light. That issue was resolved as the very next year gas lighting was installed.

Once you brought our father's footsteps to this land we hold so dear, Lengthening the cords and curtains of their habitation here, Strengthening your temple's pillars as you have from age to age, Giving us their sons and daughters, an abiding heritage.
