The Faith of our Fathers

The National Park Service was established in 1916. Rocky Mountain, Mt. McKinley (Denali), Grand Canyon and Zion were all added to the roster. And as serene and peaceful as this all sounds, peace was not in the forecast.

Despite all the turmoil in the world, Wisconsin was spreading its progressive wings. In 1917, the first road map was printed. In 1918, the state developed a highway classification and numbering system that was later adopted nationally. In 1919, it passed the first minimum wage bill, giving women, men and minors over 17, a "living wage" of 22 cents per hour. On June 19th, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin were the first 3 states to ratify the 19th amendment, giving women the right to vote. 33 more states were needed to make it official. Also, in 1919, a gentleman by the name of "Curly" Lambeau started a city team called the Green Bay Packers. They won the World Championship 6 times.

At the convention of 1917 synod reorganized as "The Synod of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Nebraska & Other States." This was the last annual convention. Hereafter, synod and the districts met in alternate years. The aggressive actions of Germany were causing a national distrust of all things German to the point of burning German books, abolishing studying the language and suspecting that German speaking people might be spies. But German Lutherans had a distrust of the English language!! If Luther was German, we should all speak German! In spite of this, most churches were now conducting services in both English and German. Interestingly, as English congregations were established, they were considered "missions." To further the cause, in 1917, a second "English Book of Hymns" was published containing over 300 songs with music and fourpart harmony. In 1918, another English publication "The Junior Northwestern" was introduced.

At St. Peter's, Gustav Bergemann has been serving as pastor since 1900 and as synod president since 1908. Because of the steadily increasing school enrollment, in 1916, the congregation purchased the 60-foot lot to the west for playground space. To defray expenses, tuition had been in place since the school was begun. In 1918, the congregation combined the school budget with the church budget

and abolished tuition for church families. The teaching staff of 4 included, Herman Goetsch, Phillip Saxmann, Miss Esther Saxmann and A. A. Moskop.

The Great War involving 30 nations broke out in earnest just before 1915. On May 17, on its voyage from New York to England, a German U-boat torpedo sand the RMS Lusitania. Of the 1900 on board, 1100 perished including 120 Americans. President Wilson was an ardent isolationist. Even after this incident, he began his second term wanting the US to remain neutral. A news story broke that a message was intercepted from Germany to Mexico urging Mexico to attack the US. Even though Mexico declined, people realized how vulnerable they were. The incident totally changed the mood of the nation. The war had already been raging for 3 years, when in April 1917, Congress voted to declare war on Germany. We joined the fray late. The use of lethal weapons including tanks, airplanes, submarines and gas warfare and the unhealthy conditions of "trench warfare" was causing a devastating loss of life.



The following year, on Armistice Day, a collective sigh of relief united the whole world. November 11, 1918, at the 11th minute of the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, peace was declared. The cost in lives was 8.5 million soldiers and 13 million civilians. US casualties were 116,000 dead and 204,000 wounded. Great Britain's losses were over 1,552,000. From 2014 to 2018 the UK memorialized those losses with a traveling display of 1,550,000 red glass poppies. Google "Tower of London Remembers WW I Centenary." In Flanders fields the poppies blow between the crosses row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky the larks still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead, short days ago we lived, felt dawn and sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.
