YEAR-END GIVING A tax-efficient way to support the ministry of St. Peter's – If you're age 70.5 and older, you can support St. Peter's by requesting a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) directly to St. Peter's. Even better, if you're age 72 and older, the QCD will count toward your required minimum distribution. Qualified Charitable Distributions (up to \$100,000 per person per year) are excluded from taxable income. Please contact your tax professional to learn how you can make a tax-wise gift to St. Peter's, the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod, or Winnebago Lutheran Academy. It is recommended to make a QCD well in advance of New Year's Eve because the money has to be out of your account and the check needs to be transferred to the

charity and deposited by the charity no later than December 31 of the current tax year.

The Faith of our Fathers

By 1930 life expectancy has risen to 58 years and infant mortality reduced to one out of every ten born. The "Star Spangled Banner" became the national anthem in 1931, and the Empire State Building opened. In 1932, progressive Wisconsin was the first state to establish unemployment compensation. It became a model for the rest of the country and in 1933 prohibition ended.

It would appear that life was getting better, but the economic situation was devastating. The Great Depression of 1929 peaked in 1933 and did not fully recover until 1942. Every person in the country suffered the effects. 14 million people were unemployed and many employed worked short hours. Speculators who bought stocks with borrowed money lost everything, therefore the lenders lost everything. As banks failed, depositors lost their savings. Farm values dropped and outstanding loans were greater than the farm was worth. Many had no income, their property went into foreclosure. In Fond du Lac, only 2 of the 5 banks survived.

March 4, 1933 Franklin Delano Roosevelt became the 32nd president defeating incumbent Herbert Hoover. Hoover was blamed for the Depression. To fulfill his campaign slogan, "A chicken for every pot!" FDR quickly acted to establish "The New Deal". In Wisconsin 92,000 men found jobs with the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The benefits of this program are still enjoyed in our state parks and forests.

Our Synod was also in financial crisis. The new seminary grounds and building were an expensive undertaking that continues to bless the church today, but following the financial collapse, the debt seemed insurmountable. The actions of synod are remarkably similar to those of the nation. At the 1933 convention presidential incumbent, Gustav Bergemann, taking the blame for the debt, was voted out, and John Brenner voted in. Bergemann had served hard and long for 25 years. Brenner would serve for the next 20.

At St. Peter's schools, the academy had graduated its first class and all classrooms of the "old" school were in use. Teacher Goetsch taught the 7th & 8th grades for many years. Because of declining health he stepped down to 5th grade and relinquished the role of principal. After a lingering illness he departed this

life March 14, 1932, just before Holy Week. He was a fixture at St. Peter's for 38 years.

In 1933 the congregation commemorated its 75th anniversary with special services on August 13th. In spite of very limited funds, a huge celebration was planned for November. It lasted an entire week. Sunday, November 19th they observed Martin Luther's 450th birthday. Tuesday, November 21st a German language reunion service was held. Those confirmed during the 56 years of 1859 through 1914 were invited. 354 of them came. Then, Thursday, November 23rd an English confirmation reunion was held. Those confirmed the 19 years of 1915 – 1933 were invited. 481 came. The celebration concluded on Sunday, November 26th with morning and evening services.

Attendance at each of these celebrations was much larger than the church could hold. The auditorium of the school became overflow seating and a loud speaker system was used. Each of these gatherings was followed by social time and refreshments. Keep in mind, this was the height of the Great Depression and the church and its members were in severe financial distress. They delayed printing an anniversary book for 5 years because there was no money. When one considers the scope of planning and executing this event one is filled with admiration for this stalwart group. When concluded, all agreed it was time and money well spent. The Christian fellowship was priceless, as was the return "to the fold" of many who had drifted away. The following year the congregation honored Pastor Bergemann celebrating 35 years with St. Peter's.

Our father's God, in years long gone, Our God for all the years to be, Accept the sacrifice of praise we bring to you on bended knee For mercies to our fathers shown, for all your grace, so rich and free To you great God, the One in Three, we sing the hymn of jubilee.

You led our fathers to this land, a land of beauty, bounty, pow'r; You blessed the labors of their hands, upheld them in each trial hour. You kept them faithful to your Word, were not ashamed their God to be. So we, their children gratefully now sing the hymn of jubilee.
