YEAR-END GIVING A tax-efficient way to support the ministry of St. Peter's – If you're age 70.5 and older, you can support St. Peter's by requesting a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) directly to St. Peter's. Even better, if you're age 72 and older, the QCD will count toward your required minimum distribution. Qualified Charitable Distributions (up to \$100,000 per person per year) are excluded from taxable income. Please contact your tax professional to learn how you can make a tax-wise gift to St. Peter's, the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod, or Winnebago Lutheran Academy. It is recommended to make a OCD well in advance of New Year's Eve because the money has to be out of your account and the check needs to be transferred to the charity and deposited by the charity no later than December 31 of the current tax year.

The Faith of our Fathers

The 1940's, another new decade. In peaceful United States the average salary was \$1,300 per year and minimum wage was \$.43 per hour; the McDonald brothers opened their efficient burger stand in California. Following the success of Snow White in 1937, Disney released his second full-length animated film, Pinocchio; and The Great Smoky Mountains became a National Park. November 5th Roosevelt won a landslide victory over Wendell Wilkie for an unprecedented third term.

Things were not so peaceful elsewhere in the world. By 1939 Germany's Hitler, Italy's Mussolini and Japan's Hirohito had entered into "the pact of steel" and each was on a quest to control the world. June 14, 1940 Paris fell to Hitler's army and the first Polish prisoners were moved to Auschwitz. From September 1940 until May 1941 London withstood the "blitz" of nightly bombing raids. Its citizens found themselves spending night after night underground in air raid shelters. Foreseeing the inevitable, July 1940 FDR got the Naval Expansion Act passed expanding the size of the US Navy by 70%. March 1941 the Lend Lease Act passed allowing the US, a neutral nation, to furnish munitions and equipment to Great Britain and the Allies. In July the US assumed responsibility to occupy and protect Iceland, a British territory. August 14 FDR and Churchill held a secret meeting onboard a ship in a Newfoundland Bay and the Atlantic Charter was signed. Churchill opened the meeting with an on-deck Christian worship service.

Then, December 7, 1941, a peaceful Sunday morning became "the day that will live in infamy", Japan attacked Pearl Harbor. Japan was looking for a one day war, they poked the sleeping giant. Although 20 ships and 300 aircraft were destroyed no aircraft carriers were lost. The entire nation became consumed by the war effort.



Hundreds of thousands were being drafted or enlisted each month. "Keep the Home Fires Burning" was an oft heard motto, and there was a spirit of unity as never felt before. To move from peacetime to full blown war in a matter of days was an incredible national effort. All vehicle manufacture changed over to military. With gas and tires extremely scarce many family cars were put up on blocks for the

duration. Everyone was issued a ration book. Nothing could be purchased without them. The motion picture industry assumed a role in the war effort. Countless training films were produced for the armed forces and movies took on a patriotic theme. Theater attendance was at an all time high. 5 different companies released newsreels twice each week. These connected people to the world at war. Prominent stars made whistle stop train trips across the country promoting war bonds. Every

classroom in the nation sold war bond stamps. For \$18.75 invested after 10 years it could be redeemed for \$25.

Wisconsin population in 1940 was 2,900,000. 330,000 Wisconsin men and 8,000 women served in the armed forces. Women entered the manufacturing workforce in unprecedented numbers. Badger Ordnance of Sauk City became the nation's largest manufacturer of munitions. Fond du Lac's Rueping Leather went into overtime producing leather for the military. Manitowoc, Sturgeon Bay and Superior became ship building assembly lines. Manitowoc produced 28 submarines. Sturgeon Bay grew from a handful of workers to over 7000 and the war department built living quarters for 600 families and 500 individuals. 258 assorted vessels were produced, each capable of fitting through the locks of The Seaway or the Mississippi.

Synod and St. Peter's were coasting along. From the depression years into the early 40's synod was still in financial trouble and many seminary graduates had to wait for calls. Synod began expansion and this situation was quickly reversed. In 1941 The Lutheran Hymnal was published by Concordia PH. It was a masterpiece. It was used by Wisconsin and Missouri Synod congregations for the next 52 years and became a textbook for university music classes as the best collection ever produced of classic chorale harmonization. In 1941, St. Peter's made the mistake of rebuilding the pipe organ. Quality materials were unavailable and it shortly needed redoing. In 1943 they were still trying to get rid of the school debt from 1925. \$7,856.70 (\$172,000 today) was owed. Pentecost Sunday became "Debt Free by Three" day. Teams of volunteers had lunch at church, then did an every-member visitation. When they regrouped at church at 3 o'clock, they had collected \$3.60 more than was needed!! Debt free at last.

"The Navy Hymn" and "Onward Christian Soldiers" were sung on that ship in Newfoundland Bay in 1941.
