The Faith of our Fathers

Memories of a World War II refugee child.

I was born in Bessarabia, Romania, of German parents whose ancestors fled Germany in 1832 for a better life. This area is directly west of the Black Sea and bordered on the south by the Danube River. The many villages retained the German language and customs. Our Lutheran Church was German. Many people followed and by 1940 there were 93,000 Germans living there. It was a good life.

In May, 1940 Stalin attacked Romania to take back Bessarabia since that area had once been part of Russia. The German settlers were fearful as they had suffered under Russian rulers before. They accepted Hitler's offer to help them leave rather than become Russians and possibly sent to Siberia. He promised to replace whatever was left behind. My parents left a large farm behind, so they should have received one in Germany. Women and children were sent ahead, the men stayed behind to bring in the bountiful harvest. I was born July 31st, right before my family left. We traveled by ship on the Danube and train to Austria and Germany.

The next year and a half were spent in camps as no homes were available. Our first camp was in Yugoslavia. We were there for 3 weeks. It had a large dining hall and hastily erected tents. Our second was Camp Wolfsberg in Austria, a former Catholic home for nuns. We were there for a year. It was here the men rejoined their families. It was very nice. The Bessarabian women did the cooking, young girls did the cleaning, and women with small children tended them. The men were put to work on roads and railroads. Bedrooms were shared by several families with curtains for walls. We slept on the floor on sacks filled with hay. Children were able to attend school as the language of Austria was German.

At Easter diphtheria ran rampant in the camp. Families were quarantined and many children died. Lilli, Helmut and Erna were hospitalized. Helmut also had scarlet fever and almost died. They operated on his throat so he could breathe. The scar is still there. When he was released my dad had to carry him back to the camp on his shoulders.

We spent 8 weeks at our last camp in Poland. We lived in summer cottages that had been owned by Jewish people, each shared with other families. Mom, who was very pregnant, had five children ages 1 to 11 to care for, Lilli, Helmut, Erna, Victor, myself. She had to walk a long distance to collect a heavy jug with our soup for the day. Wally was born at this camp in February 1942.

We finally received word that a farm was available in northern Poland. We traveled by train and arrived at Schilkendorf in May 1942. I was almost 2. Now my dad could stay home and work the farm. A good share of everything, including cows was conscripted for the army. It was joyful but sad as my parents were aware that a Polish family had been driven off this land. My mom shared whatever she could with Poles living nearby.

Things changed as the war escalated. As a young man, my Dad had served 4 years in the Romanian Military Calvary. Now, in 1944, at the age of 34, he was drafted into the German army to fight on the Russia front. In December he sent my mom a letter telling her to pack us all in our wagon and head to Germany as the Russians were winning and marching to Berlin.

We were right in the path of the advancing army. Families filled their wagons with warm bedding, clothing and as much food as they could for the long trip to safety in western Germany. We left the farm January 20, 1945 when I was 4½ years old. We joined a 10 wagon "wagon train". As we traveled other wagons joined our train. Our greatest fear was that the Russians would catch up to us. It was an extremely cold winter. Thankfully the fields were frozen solid since we often had to get off the road to let troops, even British and French march past. If we heard planes overhead and there were woods nearby, the wagons would quickly try to hide there. After our food was gone Mom would stop in the villages to find a bakery and stand in a breadline. Sometimes bread was available but at other times there was none. How sad we were because our stomachs were growling.

Cities had been bombed everywhere and most people had little to eat. We were sometimes fortunate to find a church, school, or barn to sleep in. If not, we slept in our wagon. Occasionally, kind people let us sleep in their home. How wonderful it was to warm up, have a nice meal and a warm place to sleep. One day we had to get out of the wagons and run to the woods. Airplanes were above us bombing a train and destroying the tracks next to the road. God protected us once again.

After three months traveling, on April 30, 1945, we arrived at a small village in northwest Germany. The mayor told a woman she had to share her house with us. She wasn't happy with the news but she had to let us live there. She gave us one bedroom and one kitchen area. This would be our home for the next 6 years. The war ended May 8. We had no idea where our Dad was or if he was dead or alive

Almost everyone in the village was Lutheran. In school we had Bible class each morning. I loved my 1^{st} grade teacher and the way she taught about God's love. It was then I decided I wanted to be a teacher like her. We had a lovely little church with a pastor

that served several congregations. If he wasn't there our principal read the sermon. Lilli and Helmut were confirmed there.

My dad became a prisoner of war (POW) in early April of 1945, a month before the war ended. He was shipped to a camp near Moscow that held 1,000 POW's all forced to do hard labor. Within a year 900 of the prisoners had died of severe cold, starvation or hard labor. My dad's shoes wore out and he wore newspapers on his feet. He carried our family picture in his pocket. It was by the grace of God that he survived. My dad knew the Russian language and was able to speak to the doctor who provided him with medicine.

The war left most of Germany in ruins. The bombings had destroyed cities, farms, industries and transportation. Everyone was half-starved and living conditions were dreadful. We mostly ate dark bread topped with lard, onions and salt. Oh, so yummy! Yes, it truly was to us!! We also had lots of vegetable soup which I still love today. During fall harvest we gleaned in the grain fields so Mom could bake some delicious, but never enough, bread. We picked wild berries and found mushrooms on the clean forest floor.

The governing Allies realized that many children were desperately undernourished. Erna, Victor and I were among them. During the summer of 1946, when I turned 6, we spent 6 weeks at a camp for undernourished children. We loved it there and it was really hard to go back to the meager meals at home.

My father was finally released from the POW camp in September of 1947. He was put on a cattle car and sent back home. He knew we wouldn't be in Poland anymore but had no idea where we were or if we were still alive. He got off the train in East Germany and headed for Berlin. He was emaciated and very sick. Along the way he stopped at farms looking for work, food, and a place to sleep. He finally got to Berlin and started searching for us using the Red Cross and other search organizations. Millions of people were looking for missing family members. Posts and buildings were covered with signs containing family names and addresses. By the grace of God he found his sister's address and they were reunited. She knew where we were. He was overjoyed that we were alive and he would see us soon.
